LA Back in School Full Time After Hybrid Year

We are back to full capacity at Lincoln Academy after a full year of online school and hybrid classes! Although the school's entire student body is on campus full time, masking is still required and Lincoln is still following the CDCs policies to keep the community from outbreak status. To accommodate our student body and keep distance, four separate lunches and other limits on where and how students can gather have been put in place.

Many things are different this year, including our new focused learning blocks and the new schedule consisting of eight 70-minute periods to accommodate vocational students and the academic needs of Lincoln students. At the time of publishing, there have been 18 positive COVID 19 cases. Some unvaccinated close contacts have had to be quarantined, and both girls soccer and field hockey paused their season due to positive cases.

Despite some of the challenges of these past years, Lincoln has been able to be fully in person since the first day of school.

School Threat Deemed Low Risk

On Tuesday, October 5th, a school shooter threat, eventually deemed to be low risk, was found on the wall of one of the bathrooms at Lincoln Academy. At approximately 11am, immediately following the discovery of the threat, the school became occupied by a number of officers from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office. The officers remained at Lincoln for a few hours until the Threat Assessment Team, made up of Lincoln Academy administrators and Sheriff's Office staff, felt that it was safe to disperse. Teachers were alerted to the threat after Focused Learning Block on October 5, while students and families were informed after school. The investigation is ongoing and the Lincoln Academy administration and Sheriff's Office urges anyone who has more information to report it to the Sheriff's Office.

LA Junior is All-National Sax Player



The population of the Vaquita has been decimated in recent times, with the main culprit being the gillnets used by fishermen in Mexico. Vaquitas are a bycatch product. This means they are not being targeted by fishermen. So when they are caught, they are thrown off the side of a boat. The targeted fish, the Totoaba, is also now endangered, which shows this decline is not specific.

Vaping is a very important currently a bill in the legislature subject to talk about in our uncertain world. Kids are more likely to vape during the pandemic when school is stressful. These situations are making vapes more appealing to teens. The nicotine used in vapes gets you high enough to relax you. Young people know very little of the dangers of e-cigarettes; kids will oftentimes end up trying them and get addicted, making it harder to

A national study on vaping during the pandemic found teens who have reduced their use or quit have increased a total of 67.7%. A biennial Maine survey showed that 33.2% of people reported use of e-cigarettes in 2017 and 45% in 2019.

Governor Mills has taken steps to improve Maine's e-cigarette use by launching a campaign through your TV, websites, and social media to influence users and keep the general public aware of these dangers. The goal is for teens never to start vaping. There is

that would ban e-cigarettes on school property.

Did you know that if you vape you are more likely to get COVID? It's true, just think of the symptoms; respiratory problems! COVID will take the vulnerable before the invulnerable. One study tested more than 4,300 and found that those who vape are five to seven times more likely to get COVID than those who don't. Plus those who have vaped and get COVID will have it much more severe than the person who doesn't.

As a student at Lincoln Academy, I am interested in the health of others my age. That's why I urge you to speak up if you know or hear something about young people vaping, and if you are a parent please pay attention and talk to your child today because they could be the next victim of e-cigarette use.

restrictions have proved to be a challenge in rehearsals, especially when it comes to singing. Also, most of the actors haven't performed much in the past two years, so it is an adjustment for everyone.

Before COVID, Heartwood theater put on regular plays and musicals with Lincoln students, as well as some with professional actors, the community, and middle schoolers. Students have enjoyed participating in these plays in the past, both through acting and doing sound, lighting, and other work backstage. "Being part of a play is a good way to get away from all the school work and other things that high schoolers have to deal with," said Hennig. Hennig enjoys acting and has done several Heartwood plays in the past, including Guys and Dolls, which was supposed to be performed in the spring of 2020, but was cancelled due to COVID. Actors have also said that they enjoy working with Griff Braley, the director. Everyone has been working hard to put this play together and hope folks will come see the show.

The varsity girls cross country team had an historic win on October 16, taking home their first KVAC championship title in Lincoln Academy history.




