When Olympia Snowe decided not to run for reelection in the 2012 senate race, she had campaign money left with no campaign to spend it on. After donors suggested that she put it towards a good cause, Snowe founded the Olympia Snowe Women's Leadership Institute. The institute focuses on educating and empowering Maine girls to support their families, communities, and

Every year the institute selects girls from around Maine to participate in a leadership program, enrolling 45 girls from seven schools in its first year. Today, it has grown to 555 high





On Tuesday, September 20th, Amelia Rice '26, Reese Nelson '26, and Maggie Sawyer '26 traveled to the Blaine House for "Girls Day." This was an extension of a program started by the Maine Women's Lobby focused on young female leadership in government.

These three Lincoln Academy ninth graders were selected by their teachers in 8th grade for their strong leadership skills. About 40 girls in the state are in this program. To start the program, last winter, they attended 6 weeks of zoom meetings. These meetings were

set up so they could connect with state representatives and learn more about their roles in our government. "Girls Day" was their first in-person meeting.

When they arrived at the Blaine House in Augusta, they listened to many inspiring speakers, met with Senator Chloe Maxmin, and had tea with Governor Mills. "I was very excited to be chosen for Girls Day and it is a great experience that I've learned a lot from," said Amelia Rice '26.

"I am very excited about the positive energy that students and staff have brought to the start of this school year," said Dean of Students Jake Abbott.

In addition to starting the year mask-optional, the school has returned to the full-scale return of other traditions, including homecoming (which took place in September) and fall sports.

"This is the first time in three years that we were able to have a true homecoming on campus," remarked Abbott.

"I'm really excited to bring us back and rebuild the community and rebuild the traditions that are really important to this school," said Lincoln Academy Head of School Jeffrey Burroughs.

Throughout the beginning of the 2022-23 school year, Lincoln Academy will reinstate other pre-pandemic norms. These new norms, such as decreased phone use, a dress code, and formalized privileges for upperclassmen, are part of Lincoln Academy's concerted effort to return to school with a sense of normalcy.

Lincoln Academy has seen tremendous growth in sports and extracurriculars due to the loosening of pandemicrelated restrictions and lack of worry that COVID will force an untimely end to sport seasons, theatrical productions, or musical performances.

"Lots of kids are participating in sports, and the musical is off to a great start," said Burroughs. "Numbers are up in those kinds of activities, including performing arts."

"There's lots to be excited about," said Burroughs.

Aiden Jacobs 23' is a returning member of the Talon staff and wants to be here just so so bad. In addition to the actual photo of the fish, an unknown artist recreated the incident with a mixed-media painting left in the boys bathroom the day after the incident.

This piece of art was collected by Mr. O'Mahoney in an effort to both preserve the painting and stop the cycle of fishthemed pranks. "I do love public art, and someone put sincere effort into the piece. I wanted this painting to have a more suitable home."

Students later consulted local biologist Jason Seiders '93, who identified the fish as a red shiner.

school girls from 37 schools across the state of Maine. Lincoln was the most recent addition to the program, joining in 2020. "We're extremely lucky to have this program at Lincoln Academy," said Kelley Duffy, the program's faculty advisor. "Any opportunity we have to support these girls is a huge bonus."

Each school in the program nominates 5 freshman girls from the incoming class to join, although they are considering expanding numbers to 7. To be nominated, a student must be in good academic standing, identify as female, and be a resident of Maine. Other than that, there aren't any major requirements. The program is looking for "10th-12th grade girls who show great potential, but may not yet have experienced the opportunity to expand their views of their potential and the possibilities that exist for their futures," according to the

Institute's website.

Current members from the

Class of 2024 include Lucy White, Kayla Cruz, and Violet Bailey. Class of 2025 participants are Anna Lupien, Lila Neptune-Benner, Caroline Mathews, Jay Ebanks, Leah Gemeinhardt, Maeve Tholen, and Alison Roberts.

The course runs for 3 years (10th, 11th, and 12th grades) and involves monthly meetings during FLB period with mentors. These mentors are women from a wide variety of industries who work with the students for all three years. "Two of the current mentors are LA alums, which has been nice to see them around," Duffy added. Others are bankers, college admissions officers, and women in leadership roles. "The mentors are welcoming, nice people, who seem interested in what they are doing with the program," commented Anna Lupien '25.

Additionally, there are fall and spring conferences that include all the students in the state who are involved in the program.

The fall conference was held on September 29 in Bangor. "It was a super cool experience and an amazing opportunity to network and meet people from around the state," Lupien said. "It was a really inspiring event, especially seeing everyone from all over the state gathered together. We got to listen to some empowering speakers and make connections with new people," Lupien added.

Being involved in the program teaches participants skills in public speaking, leadership, networking, and other abilities. The program's website states, "[our] three-year evidence-based program is fulfilling an unmet need, and is designed to intervene at a pivotal moment in girls' development, giving them the skills and confidence that will serve them well throughout their lives." Additionally, completion of the program awards students with college

the Becton Cup, Women's Maine State Championships as well as the ACCs at the very end of the season. If you want to test out LA sailing and see if practice!



Following up their trip to the Vex Robotics Worlds Championship last May, the Lincoln Academy Robotics Team is participating in the 22-23 competition Spin Up.



the enemy team. At the end of the match, the regulations on sizing are removed, and bots can extend and stretch out as far as they can to score additional points.

#### Senior Privileges

This year's senior privileges are now in effect. They were proposed by Senior Class Officers and approved by the administration. Seniors can earn privileges with proper attendance and academic standing, including maintaining a grade point average of 75 or higher in all of their classes. They may not have more than five unexcused absences or tardies each trimester. Seniors can apply for these privileges by filling out a form at the front

Seniors with privileges may arrive late if they have a firstperiod study hall, provided that they still get to advisory by 9:15 am and check in to the office upon arrival. They may also leave school early if they have a fourth-period study hall providing they sign out. Finally, seniors have the opportunity to skip Focused Learning Block. Seniors with a fourth-period study hall may return for FLB, but they must check in at the main office.

Additional privileges include listening to music during study hall with the use of earbuds or

headphones. Seniors may also go to the dining commons during periods 1, 2, and 4 study halls. Lastly, seniors have the highest priority to exit the school after community meetings end. These privileges will be evaluated when trimester progress reports come. Anytime the requirements of the privileges are not met, the school administration reserves the full authority to revoke

your teacher to figure out what FLB blocks work best for you!









#### Vehicle of the Month

#### October 2022 Featured Vehicle: Garrett Howard's Toyota Tacoma

October's nomination goes to Garretr Howard '23's modified white Toyota Tacoma.

This truck has around 278 horsepower with an SR5 V-6 Engine and the TRD package. This specific vehicle has what appears to be a metal skid plate, an added bullbar, and a bed rack.

The owner hasn't contacted the *Talon* to fill us in on any internal modifications, so we're guessing stock internals in this beast of a vehicle.

The Tacoma is able to get around 22 miles per gallon, assuming it is on the open road, and 18 in citied areas, has a maximum payload capacity of around 1,440 pounds (653 kilograms), and can tow 6,800

Senior Garrett Howard's Toyota Tacoma is the Lincoln Academy October, 2022 Vehicle of the Month pounds (3,084 kilograms).

This specific Tacoma is equipped with a crew cab, is rear wheel drive but is capable of 4 wheel drive, and differential lock is weak, albeit present. This particular model is equipped with a winch, and various LED lighting is present all across the chassis and embedded in the body panels, as well as the corners of the windshield.


