

Application deadline.....Admission decision

Early Decision...Early to mid-Nov/mid-Dec

Early Action.....Early to mid-Nov/mid-Dec

Regular decision......Early January to mid-February Mid-March to early April

Rolling admission......Varies:4-6 weeks after submission



How do I learn more about a particular school?

1. Google – Obvious, but true. Search interesting phrases like "What students really think about LMU" or "Grinnell students' forum." https://www.niche.com/colleges/grinnell-college/

Find students' perspective. What do alumni say? You're collecting quotations, ideas and phrases. Don't be afraid to quote, borrow and re-phrase.

2. Fiske Guide Online-

https://www.amazon.com/Fiske-Guide-Colleges-2023-Edward/dp/1492665002

It's long been one of the best resources for info about schools. It's online, it's searchable, and it's worth the \$20.

3. Unigo- https://www.unigo.com/

Read real student reviews. They're great because they're by actual students who aren't worried what the school thinks of what they say. (Official publications don't want to say anything too bad about a school, so most schools seem great.) Go to the Unigo section that asks "What's the stereotype of the students at your school?" and "Is the stereotype true?" If ten students in a row say the school is "intellectual, sporty, white," chances are there's some truth to it. TIP: If the "stereotype" comments contradict one another (one student says "hippie school," another says "nerdy," and another says "jocks and frat boys," that could be a sign that it's actually a pretty diverse school).



4. Books-

Remember books? The paper kind? Though much of the info is online, there are still a few good books with good info (available at your local bookstore or on Amazon.com):


5. Real and virtual tours – The single best way to get to know a school is to go there. If you can, do it.

- ●Type in the name of the school and "onlinetour." Example: Hobart and William Smith Colleges

TIP: Take at least five online tours (it'll take you about 30 minutes) so you can compare schools.



Student and counselor work together.

Student responsibilities:

Matching Common Application and Naviance Accounts (Individual Senior Meetings have just begun)

Completing and submitting the application forms, essays, test scores, and fee

Lincoln Academy responsibilities: Submitting counselor and teacher recommendations, secondary school report, official transcript, and school profile

Senior Spring

Deadlines-Need to keep track of deadlines.

- -November 1st and November 15th deadlines hear back 12/15 February. Winter deadlines will hear back in March.
- -Schedule a meeting to discuss outside scholarships (Naviance)
- -College visits February break? April break?
- -Students select and confirm with a school by May 1st.



International Students

- TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) is still required
- International Student Application for College Admission
- Evidence of Financial Support
- International StudentFinancial Aid Application
